

# With Thanksgiving coming up the USS Wilhoite Association would like to wish each and every one a very HAPPY THANKSGIVING.

Our modern, national celebration of Thanksgiving can be attriuted to the efforts of Sarah Josepha Hale, a woman who became a widow in her 30's and wore black the rest of her life to outwardly demonstrate the loss she continued to mourn. I think that is a good place to start with a review of what it really means to have a Happy Thanksgiving.

Ms. Hale grew up in New England, where an annual festival of thanksgiving was regionally celebrated. This tradition followed in the lead of the Pilgrim Fathers and Founding Fathers. We know about the feast of 1621. Fewer may be aware that presidents Washington, Adams and Madison all designated days of thanksgiving for the new nation, but it lacked permanence and such declarations were at the whim of the office-holder. For the most part, the idea of setting aside a day every year to thank God for the bounty and blessing He provided remained a practice of the northern strates.

Following the death of her husband, Ms. Hale became a very influential voice in American 19th century life as the editor of Godey's Lady's Book. It was with this platform that she began her personal crusade to see Thanksgiving become a nationaly-recognized celebration. It took many years and Ms. Hale engaged a number of presidents before her entreaty to President Lincoln two months after the Battle Gettysburg achieved a result. In the midst of a bloody war and six days after Ms. Hale wrote to him, President Lincoln encouraged all U.S. citizens to set aside the last Thursday in November...as a day of thanksgiving and praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the heavens." Our day of thanksgiving was born in our nation's darkest hours and was championd by a woman who suffered a tragic loss, and President Johnson followed Lincoln and continued the annual practice. Congress ultimately designated Thanksgiving as a national holiday in 1870, and in 1941 set the official date of Thanksgiving as the fourth Thursday of November.

Thanskgiving allows us to take time to stop and appreciate the acts of divine providence in our lives. There should certainly be joyful celebration - the Pilgrim's feast lasted three days - but I encourage all Americans to make it about more than just turkey, football and Black Friday shopping. Remember the genesis of this day and those who celebrated it before. Happiness for them was demonstrated with an attitude of gratitude. As your family gives thanks to God for the blessings He has given us, I encourage you and yours to do the same. **HAPPY THANKSGIVING!** 



### GOD BLESS OUR PRECIOUS HEROES.

#### Van T Barfoot died...

Remember the guy who wouldn't take the flag pole down on his Virginia property awhile back?

You might remember the news story several months ago about a crotchety old man in Virginia who defied his local Homeowners Association, and refused to take down the flag pole on his property along with the large American flag he flew on it. Now we learn who that old man was.

On June 15,1919, Van T. Barfoot was born in Edinburg, Texas. That probably didn't make news back then. But twenty-five years later, on May 23, 1944, near Carano, Italy, that same Van T. Barfoot, who had in 1940 enlisted in the U.S. Army, set out alone to flank German machine gun positions from which gunfire was raining down on his fellow soldiers. His advance took him through a minefield but having done so, he proceeded to single-handedly take out three enemy machine gun positions, returning with 17 prisoners of war.



And if that wasn't enough for a day's work, he later took on and destroyed three German tanks sent to retake the machine gun positions.



That probably didn't make much news either, given the scope of the war, but it did earn Van T.Barfoot, who retired as a Colonel, after also serving in Korea and Vietnam, a well deserved

Congressional Medal of Honor.

What did make news...Was his Neighborhood Association's quibble with how the 90-year-old veteran chose to fly the American flag outside his suburban Virginia home. Seems the HOA rules said it was OK to fly a flag on a house-mounted bracket, but, for decorum, items such as Barfoot's 21-foot flag pole was "unsuitable".


Van Barfoot had been denied a permit for the pole, but **e**rected it anyway and was facing court action unless he agreed to take it down.





Then the HOA story made national TV, and the Neighborhood Association re-thought its position and agreed to indulge this aging hero who dwelt among them.

"In the time I have left", he said to the Associated Press, "I plan to continue to fly the American flag without interference." As well he should. And if any of his neighbors had taken a notion to contest him further, they might have done well to read his Medal of Honor citation first. Seems it indicates Mr.Van Barfoot wasn't particularly good at backing down.


Twas the night before Christmas, the ship was out steaming,
