

Newsmaking Ship Sponsored By Daytonans

THE USS WILHOITE, which recently was credited with making the largest capture of enemy ammunition in Vietnam, is sponsored by a Daytona Beach couple: Mr. and Mrs. M. C. Wilhoite, 221 S. Ridgewood Ave.

They're the parents of the late Ensign Thomas M. Wilhoite, for whom the ship was named. He was killed in action in 1942 while flying over Casablanca during the North African invasion in World War II. He posthumously received the Silver Star, the Purple Heart and several other decorations.

MRS. WILHOITE christened the ship in 1943 and since then has provided it with a library of books. Both she and her husband have for many years contributed time, effort, and gifts to veterans' hospitals and veterans' activities, as well as gifts and letters

As the ship's sponsors, the Wilhoites are notified when the command of the ship changes, the ship receives citations or otherwise makes news. They regularly keep in touch with the men aboard the ship.

Now in Vietnam waters, the Wilhoite is home based in Pearl Harbor and is the flagship of Escort Squadron Five. It's the winner of two Presidential Unit Citations and has seen action in the Atlantic and Pacific since being commissioned 25 years ago.

RECENTLY, THE SHIP was recom-


mended for a Navy Unit Commendation for the largest single capture of enemy arms and ammunition since the beginning of the Vietnam war. The men aboard the Wilhoite sank an enemy ship off the coast of Vietnam to make the capture.

A school in Kenitra, Morocco, for children of servicemen stationed there also was named for their son. Called the Thomas Mack Wilhoite High School, it's maintained by the U.S. Government. The Wilhoites also have furnished books for the school, which was dedicated in January, 1964.

The Wilhoites have lived here 23 years. They came from Kentucky.

WILHOITE/NAVY INFORMATION

The Sardine Can

Sent to us by Dick Scheeder

Sometime in 1959 while on patrol on the mid-Pacific DEW line, we encountered a bad storm. In the DER configuration the Wilhoite's superstructure was more Aluminum than steel. We normally steamed within a 50 mile circle for a patrol area. Because of this restriction on our position, it was frequently not possible to to pick the best course to protect the ship from damage from the sea - forget the crew walking with one foot on the deck and the other on the bulkheads. This particular time we had lost forward lifelines and had damage to Mount 31 splinter shield. Fire hoses and other small equipment on the focsle were gone. We also lost the aft height finding radar antenna on the 01 level just forward of Mount 32. If memory serves, it fell over to the main deck and we were able to secure it for the rest of the patrol.

Sometime on the mid-watch the sea cracked the ships Afuminum hull plating. It is long enough now that the details are hazy. It could have been a weld or the hull plate itself. It broke in a vertical line and separated from the frames on the port side of the main deck-in the Engineers Berthing Compartment. Some water may have been spotted on the deck early on, but would have been dismissed given the way we were being pounded. Later that morning the engineers occupying the forward outboard berths were wet down by the sea. The plating had pulled away from the frame and rolled back as you would a sardine can. Each hit by a wave rolled it back more. After frantic communications with the bridge we changed course to take our beating from different direction. To the best of my memory there was, eventually, a 6 foot opening.

We had a truly top notch shipfitter, Vern Valiant, on board. The recovery from this event was solely his brainchild and his project. Mattresses were put up to the opening to minimize the amount of water that was running through the compartment. With daylight our shipfitter had devised a way to pull the plating back in place so it could be welded or somehow be reattached to the ships frames. The weather and a course change allowed us to suspend the shipfitter over the side (secured by a line) to fit a piece of large diameter pipe through the rolled plate. Then he ran a chain through the pipe and rigged this assembly to a chain fall secured forward of the damage. He managed to unroll the plating enough that it could be worked flat with bars and hammers. It could not be closed enough to weld, but he was able to bolt a temporary section of steel to the loose plate and to the ships frame until we could get to port. The water flow through the engineer's compartment was reduced to a trickle and we finished the patrol. There were some requests from the engineers for submarine pay but they were denied on what we considered very flimsy arguments.

Replacing the damage caused by loss of the radar antenna and the hull plating sent us to the shipyard on our return to Pearl Harbor.

Dr. Shannon P. Pratt

April 12, 1933 - Nov. 26, 2021



Shannon Pease Pratt, 88, of Portland, died in his sleep on the morning of Nov. 26, 2021, at his home. He was born April 12, 1933, in Seattle, Wash., to Randall Shannon Pratt and Edna Pease Pratt. He spent his childhood in Seattle; on Bainbridge Island, and in Portland. He was a graduate of Grant High School (Portland), the University of Washington, bachelor's in Business Administration, and Indiana University, doctorate in

Business Administration/Finance.

He attended Navy Supply Corps School in Athens, Ga., during which time he met Mildred Martin, his wife of 57 years. He served in the Navy as Supply Officer, Lieutenant Jr. Grade, on the USS Wilhoite, stationed in Seattle and Hawaii. In the Navy he volunteered as ship chaplain. Shannon worked in his father's grocery broker business, was a professor at Portland State University, and founded both Willamette Management Associates and Shannon Pratt Valuations. He was a pioneer in the field of business valuations, teaching courses and speaking around the world at legal, professional, and trade meetings. He is the author

of numerous books and dozens of articles.

Shannon's first love was his family. He was constantly planning adventures, including multiple family vacations in Wyoming. He enjoyed camping, hiking, model railroading, hosting parties, and traveling the world. He played the ukulele, backgammon, and racketball. He loved reciting limericks, leading camp songs, dancing, and going to shows. The day was never long enough for Shannon. Despite declining mobility from strokes, nothing deterred him from seeking new challenges. A member of Valley Community Presbyterian church since 1971, he served on committees and ensured a Christian foundation for his children.

He was preceded in death by his parents; his wife, Mildred in 2015; and his son, Steven in 2017. He is survived by children, Mike Pratt (Barb Brooks) of Portland, Susan Wilder (Tim) of Springfield, Va., Georgia Senor (Tom) of Bentonville, Ark.; grandchildren, Elisa, Katie, Randali, Graham, John, Calvin, Addy, Kenny, Meg, and Zeph; great-grandchildren, Abigail, Liam, and James; and Jenny Pratt. The family is indebted to many dedicated caregivers who have lovingly

tended to Shannon in his home for several years.

A family graveside service will take place at Willamette National Cemetery in December. A memorial service will be held at 1 p.m., Thursday, Jan. 6, 2022, at Valley Community Presbyterian Church, Portland. Arrangements are under the direction of Riverview Abbey Funeral Home.
